Information Sharing

- In the month of April, the Residents responded on **29** calls in 136, **6** calls in 166, and **0** calls in 146.
- Recent In District Wildland/Vegetation/Smoke Investigation Events:
 - May 15, unattended burn pile on Jackson Creek, extinguished with 136 and 117.
- Other significant Calls:
 - Station personnel responded to the trestle fire along the Mary's River on May 2.
- In the last month, the Residents worked **1,872** Shift Hours.

- 6 of the RRVs/RCVs are state licensed EMTs. The other 3 are in process. They have all completed the class portion of EMT School.
